 <p><b>Reading with your child at home is a fantastic way to help them learn.</b></p> <p><b>Regular reading of high quality texts will:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>-Increase reading stamina</li> <li>-Improve fluency</li> <li>-Develop vocabulary and understanding of new, ambitious words in context</li> <li>-Hopefully encourage a love for reading!</li> </ul> <p><b>It is important that your child reads every night- even if just for 10 minutes.
