TACKLING ROBBERY OFFENCES IN WOLVERHAMPTON

We would like to make you aware there have been a small increase in the number of robberies across the city Top Tips for Keeping Safe

Electronic items such as mobile phones and ipods are regular targets for street robbers. Keep valuable items out of sight whenever possible.

Try and stick to well-lit areas when walking alone and always remain aware of your surroundings. If you don't feel safe, stride confidently to deter robbers and quickly move away from the area.

If your mobile phone is stolen, call your network immediately or ring 08701 123123 to get it blocked. Make a note of the IMEI number of your phone. You can find this printed under the battery of most devices.

Never wear gold chains or necklaces over the top of clothing. Thieves can snatch this from around your neck and make a quick getaway.

Walk with a friend where possible. Always let someone know where you are going and what time you will return.

Carry any bags securely. Put the strap across your body and make sure any fasteners or zips are closed and facing towards your body.

If you use a cash point, try to do so during daylight. Wherever possible, use cash machines inside banks or building societies. If you have to use a cash point at night, go with a friend and stay alert at all times. Don't let your mobile or headphones restrict your ability to notice traffic, strangers or potential trouble.

We have increased patrols and will be actively targeting thieves using a number of police tactics.

Wolverhampton is one of the safest cities in the UK. By following this advice, you can further decrease the chances of becoming a victim of robbery.

History Day Summer Term


This half term West Park have put aside our everyday learning to become historians, learning all about an invention that has had an impact on our lives today. Each year group were given a starting point and then were encouraged to use their **enquiry skills** to create their own questions. Children worked collaboratively to find the answers to their own research questions and have presented their findings in very creative ways.



Reception explored the invention of the wheel and how it has impacted our lives today.

Year 1 have been learning about the beginning of vaccines and injections. They learnt that Edward Jenner created the first vaccine to cure smallpox, and that his discoveries have had a huge impact on Science and Medicine, all the way to us today!





Year 2 have discovered that Stephenson's rocket was not actually the name of a rocket but was the name of a train! The rocket was entered into a competition in 1829. Although the rocket was not the first steam train, it brought together lots of things from different trains and became the template for lots of other steam trains in the next 150 years to come.

Year 3 learnt about how computers have changed since they were first invented. The children were amazed about the size of the first computers! They explored how computers were used to begin with and looked at how their use has changed over time. They also considered a quote from Ken Olsen, co-founder of a major computing company: "There is no reason



anyone would want a computer in their home." They investigated all the ways


computers are used at home and in our daily lives and agreed that this quote no longer applies to modern times as there are lots of reasons why people have computers at home!



Year 4 have been exploring the Morse Code. Did you know that it was created by Samuel Morse after the news that his wife was sick arrived a month too late and he returned home to find that his wife had died! Morse created a series of dots and dashes — the Morse Code — to speed up communication over longer distances. We

learnt the international help signal SOS and used lights and buzzers to recreate the code.

Year 5 have researched the work of Thomas Edison, particularly his work on the Light bulb. A reporter asked Edison "How did it feel to fail a thousand times?" Edison replied "I didn't fail a thousand times, the lightbulb was an invention with a thousand steps. Great success is built on failure, frustration and even catastrophe."





Year 6 have chosen their own areas of flight to investigate and explore. Some of the children have explored hot air balloons, others have investigated significant people in the evolution of flight including the Wright Brothers, Amy Johnson and Amelia Earhart. One group of children chose to look at the impact of flight during World War 2, and another investigation highlighted the space

race and how flight has taken us out of this world.


