
Year I have learnt about Rosa Parks and her bravery at standing up for equality.




- This term, all classrooms have new book areas.

- Our own fantastic library is open at lunchtimes for children to borrow books too.


Handwriting

In a survey at the end of the summer term, we asked children a range of questions.

Good news

More than 90% love being physically active in school and have lots of opportunites for this — we have bought lots of resources to help this, and employ sports coaches too!

Most older children also say they brush their teeth twice aday.

Bad news

A quarter of children in the school say they have never been to a dentist. Please arrange this for your child. I have asked the school nurse to provide a list of NHS dentists and will share this ASAP. Less than half of children in reception, years 1 and 2 said they brushed their teeth twice a day.

Only 37% said they ate 5 protions of fruit a day. Can you help your child eat more? We will look at these areas next half term.

RE: NSPCC's Speak out. Stay safe. online programme

I am pleased to tell you that this term we will be participating in the **NSPCC's Speak out. Stay safe. online** programme. This consists of an online assembly and supporting classroom based activities. *Speak out. Stay safe.* is a safeguarding programme available to all primary schools in the UK and Channel Islands. It aims to help children understand abuse in all its forms and to recognise the signs of abuse in a child friendly way. Children are taught to speak out if they are worried, either to a trusted adult or Childline.

In the online assembly, the *Speak out. Stay safe*. messages are delivered in a fun and interactive way with the help of their mascot Buddy as well as special quest appearances from Ant and Dec.

We have studied the content of the materials and are extremely confident that they are appropriate for primary-school-aged children. By the end of the programme, we're convinced children will feel empowered – knowing how they can speak out and stay safe.

We are urgently seeking families with children or services working directly with families whom may benefit from our project.






Maths News




The Maths News will also share family puzzles, useful websites, and Times Tables Rock Star (TTRS) events as we move into next half term.
